I hope you are all safe and well.


These are difficult times we have to get through and I wish to share with you some good news received from our colleagues around the world.

Let's keep our spirits up and continue to look forward and celebrate the international Costume committee, a group of wonderful people united by the same passion for Costume History.

Alexandra Palmer, the Royal Ontario Museum's Nora E. Vaughan Senior Curator, was awarded the <u>Costume Society of America's prestigious Millia Davenport Publication Award 2020</u> for her book *Christian Dior: History and Modernity, 1947-1957*. The award recognizes excellence in scholarship in the study of costume in a published book or exhibition catalogue that makes a significant contribution to the field. The Costume Society of America's jury praised the book as "a glorious document of a collection that sets the bar for how museums should write about clothes — acknowledging all parts of the creation process — designer, makers, public relations, marketing, and consumers. This book makes the House of Dior three-dimensional".

Christian Dior: History and Modernity, 1947-1957 is a companion publication to the ROM original exhibition, Christian Dior. Following a highly successful run at the ROM, the exhibition travelled to the China National Silk Museum in Hangzhou and will be presented at the McCord Museum in Montréal later this year.

Valerie Steele, Director and Chief Curator of the Museum at the Fashion Institute of Technology, New York, is the guest curator of the exhibition "Treasures of Fashion" at the Kobe Fashion Museum in Japan, opened mid-April and closed because of the Covid19 health crisis. The exhibition should be on view again from 5th June 2020.

Valerie organized "Treasures of Fashion" in several mini exhibitions: 1) Rococo, based on their 18th-century dress collection; 2) Chanel and her Rivals, in two parts - one on the 1910s-1939 during the golden age of the couturiere when her rivals were mostly women like Schiaparelli, Vionnet, and Lanvin, and part two, on the post-war era when Chanel competed mostly with men like Dior, Balenciaga, and Givenchy; 3) Japan and western fashion, about the influence of the kimono on western dress; and 4) object and image, based on the museum' terrific collection of fashion photography, but also ending with three examples of late 20th-century Japanese avant-garde fashion.
