Dear ICOM Costume Friends and Members,

Hope you are all safe and well. July was, for many reasons, really busy on ICOM's front. According to French laws regulating ICOM, virtual meetings for AC and GA had to take place before 31st of July 2020. As ICOM members you might have learned about the resignation of ICOM president, as well as others on the Executive Board and at ICOM secretariat. All information is made available in the ICOM member space.

July is usually the period of the Haute Couture defiles in Paris. Because of the pandemic, Paris Fashion week took place online from 6th to 8th July 2020 featuring 33 Haute Couture houses, and from 9th to 13th July for 67 brands of men's ready-to-wear collections.

Dior defile Haute Couture Femme 2020-2021 presented the enchanted world of Maria Grazia Chiuri in a film. Under the circumstances, the fashion designer created her collection in miniature.

This collection refers to the "Theatre de la mode", the travelling project created in 1945 to promote French Haute Couture abroad.
