Dear ICOM Costume Friends and Members,

I received news from a new and interesting Textile Centre in North America, Washington DC (USA).

The Cotsen Textile Traces Study Collection represents a lifetime of collecting by business leader and philanthropist Lloyd Cotsen (1929-2017). Comprised of nearly 4,000 small textiles, fragments and garments from all over the world, it offers insights into human creativity from antiquity to the present.

The collection was donated to the George Washington University in 2018, and it is now housed in the new Cotsen Textile Traces Study Center at the George Washington University Museum and The Textile Museum.

Although George Washington University and The Textile Museum in Washington are operating virtually this semester, there has been lots of activity, including the roll out of the new Cotsen Textile Traces Study Center.

The entire Cotsen Textile Traces Study <u>Collection is now online</u>, accessible through an emerging landing page, <u>cotsentextiles.gwu.edu</u>, and their Instagram account, <u>@CotsenTextiles</u>, is generating conversation about artworks in the collection.

On October 21-22, the center will be testing out their first program: a virtual global roundtable that will bring together scholars, museum professionals, and artists from five continents for panels inspired by artworks in the Cotsen Textile Traces Study Collection. We are invited to join for any or all of the roundtable sessions.

The Cotsen Textile Traces Global Roundtable commemorates the new study center and offers a glimpse of the richness of the Cotsen Textile Traces Study Collection. Beginning with an introduction to Mr. Cotsen's collecting and an overview of the collection and study center, the roundtable will feature five one-hour panels highlighting textiles from five continents.

This inaugural roundtable seeks to encourage textile research, facilitate critical discussion, support cultural diversity and preserve cultural heritage by creating direct connections between collection objects and current research and art-making, while engaging with scholars, curators, conservators, and artists.
