Hajar Alkhasova, board member of the international Committee ICMAH (for museums and collections of Archaeology and History) is calling upon the committee for information about 'Gurama' (patchworks) for a book project lead by her museum in Baku (Azerbaijan).

Since December 2020, Icherisheher Museum Center under Icherisheher State Historical-Architectural Reserve Administration has been working to restore "Gurama" patchwork art, preserving the ancient historical roots and traditions.

The main goal of the project is to give a new life to "Gurama" art, which was widely used until the early twentieth century, but was in danger of being forgotten as some traditional arts. The Revival of "Gurama" art will help to preserve, develop and promote ethno-art forms and traditions, to develop craft skills (which are about to disappear among the local people), to introduce this art form to the world and to pass it on to future generations.
